

# ONE DOG. MUST LOVE ROCKS, STRING INSTRUMENTS AND GYPSIES.

#### A story of a dogged determination

#### Based on an interview with Tom LaFrenais

Tom LaFrenais is a very charming and funny man. When I met him he had a long streak of dark humour in him and a case of infectious giggles. Neither of us could stop laughing despite the sadness at the core of his story.

From a young age he was mad about earth sciences. "Nothing could deter me from exploring rock and earth formations, streams and rivers, hills and beaches. That burning curiosity led me straight to uni, a geology degree and career in resource exploration."

Life carried on happily for him until 2007 when he sustained a serious injury to the right side of his brain, leaving him unable to continue to work as a geo scientist. To make matters worse, he could no longer play string instruments like the guitar, violin or cello – his other passions.

Unsure of what else to do with himself, he hit the road, leaving behind everything. Literally, everything.

"Riverbeds and roadsides became my home...I hitch-hiked around and across Australia for years. I became a gypsy. I even tried stopping in a few places. Perth was one of those places, but nothing felt right. After a while, I started thinking about how to get out of a life that had become a dead end – a cul de sac.

The best way for me to do this is through education. You can never go wrong with it. It changes everything and is always a growth experience. I knew I was heading back to uni soon."

Deciding in the autumn of 2013 to hitch across the desert, he landed in Adelaide. "I had so many bad associations with other places and I'd never been here before. I just thought 'Wow. This place doesn't remind me of anything. It's awesome.'

Adelaide swooped me up in its arms and said, 'Come on, Tom, come and stay here'. I've had a love affair with the city every since."

After settling in at The Terrace, one of Unity's boarding houses, Tom did his research. "I looked at Flinders and found just the right opportunity to study and I love the campus. It's beautiful."



Now I'm in my first year of a BA. My brain injury means I don't have the ability to recall all the facts and variables that I need to continue in the sciences, but now I'm interested in creative writing and philosophy. It's just as analytical as any science and takes enormous concentration, but I can manage it with my injury. And I really like it."

There's only one thing Tom loves more than geology, the cello and his new course of study - and that's DOGS. He desperately wants one as a companion and is working his way toward getting one. "Companion dogs are incredibly good for the health and well-being of people with head injuries. I just need to work through the red tape. I'll get there somehow. I'm on a mission. A canine mission."

# Would you like a bit of extra money?

Many of Unity's housing tenants are eligible for Commonwealth Rent Assistance, a type of government assistance to help people pay their rent. However, about 20% do not receive it. Interested in finding out if you're entitled to more financial assistance? Contact Centrelink to apply. Centrelink has improved its customer service a lot in recent years. Don't be afraid that you'll be stuck in the queue for hours. Give it a try. You don't need to take anything with you, other than your identification. Just tell them you want to apply for Commonwealth Rent Assistance and if you are eligible, they will give you some papers to fill out.

A single parent with one or two kids paying at least \$344.87 rent a fortnight, you could receive up to **\$147.98** extra a fortnight.

A single person on a Disability Support Pension who is paying at least \$280.53 rent a fortnight, you could receive up to **\$126.40** extra
