Community garden blooms in Mitchell Park

We are grateful to Marion Council and a grant of \$5,500 to use towards our community garden project that enabled us to employ and have the expertise of organic landscape gardener Steven Hoepfner to bring this project to life. His knowledge and expertise have been instrumental in getting us to this point.

The foundation was laid and we painted shipping containers that became our planters.

We decided to build our vegetable garden using wicking beds, which are a revolutionary way of watering. A water reservoir sits under the soil at the base of each bed. This helps save time, water and produces healthy and robust veggies.

Our planter boxes were made from recycled shipping crates and were painted and assembled on site.

We sourced recycled materials wherever possible, keeping costs down and reducing our carbon footprint.

In February, we begun planting and chose to without the use of chemicals. To date we have lettuce, black kale, beetroot, rocket, cauliflower, capsicum, zucchini, eggplant, marjoram, oregano, thyme turkey, sage, lemon verbena and lemon bergamot.

We hope to connect with other community gardens to swap seeds and share information. This project has brought tenants together and everyone is excited at the thought of harvesting and eating the food that we have grown.

Register for parenting workshop

The sessions will explore

- what you want to take from your childhood and what you want to leave behind,
- what to expect as children's brains develop and understanding how it is different to adult brains,
- what you do well as a parent and what you could build on, and
- knowing your rights as a parent and how to navigate the family legal system.



The men's group is now open for bookings and will commence on **Tuesday, May 8** from 1pm until 3pm at the Minor Works Building (22 Stamford Court, Adelaide SA 5000) and will run weekly for six sessions.

Unity helps Sam make a fresh start

Since fleeing persecution, torture and imprisonment in Pakistan, Sam has adjusted to a safer and more peaceful life in the state's south east, specifically Naracoorte, where he has been a Unity tenant for the past four years.

"Before I came to Australia I had too many problems in Afghanistan and Pakistan," Sam says. "I was put in jail for about six months because I'm a musician, a singer. The Taliban says you cannot sing."

To show his love and appreciation for his new home, Sam penned a love song for Australia, which he released with a film clip to coincide with Australia Day this year. The clip was filmed in Mount Gambier, Naracoorte, Adelaide, Canberra and Sydney. "I love this country and Australian culture," he says. "I hope everyone helps and supports this country. It's a very good life here and the best place in the world. I like singing for Australia."



Despite facing a daily reminder that he is separated from his children, who live in Pakistan, Sam has been active in immersing himself in his community and appreciating the opportunities he has been given. "I volunteer in the second hand shop, selling clothes and other things," he says. "Sometimes I don't like my life, thinking I am not a good father for my children but I pray that one day my kids will be here too and we can be together."

Prepare for winter – how to draught-proof your home

Even if your home is well-insulated, heated or cooled air can leak in and out through gaps and cracks and even exhaust fans.

Draught-proofing (or weather sealing) your home is one of the easiest and cheapest ways of reducing your energy bills and improving comfort levels with little or no fuss.

- Save up to 25% on your heating and cooling bill
- Easy and affordable to implement
- Noticeable improvements to household comfort levels

Draught-proofing at a glance

Seal gaps and cracks

Look for gaps and cracks and block or fill them. They are often found around doors and windows. Check floorboards, architraves, skirting boards, skylights and cornices – anywhere there are joins. If you are concerned about gaps around window and door architraves, your Housing Officer is the first point of contact so please phone or email them.

Install draught stoppers

Put draught stoppers at the base of doors to help keep warm air in during winter and cool air from escaping in summer. There are a number of different products on the market including flexible strips that attach permanently to the bottom of your door to the humble fabric sausage.

Check fans, vents and other outlets

To avoid heat loss from evaporative cooling ducts during winter you can cover them with a specifically designed cover or, for a cheaper option, simply clean the vent and cover it with clear plastic contact that you can remove when the weather warms up again.

Remember to heat and cool only the rooms that are being used – shut off areas of the home that you are not in and save on the cost of heating/cooling the whole house. You can also use blinds and window furnishing to block out the sun or keep the warmth in.

Avoid being fined for hard waste dumping



Some local councils offer tenants free at-call hard waste collections. Your Housing Officer can provide information about what can and cannot be collected as part of your free hard waste service. They can also advise how much hard waste you can place out for collection. Elderly tenants, or people with a permanent disability, may be eligible for free assistance moving items onto the footpath.

You are encouraged to utilise this service as illegal dumping can attract a fine of up to \$1,000.

Here at Unity, we want to know more about you and how you feel about the services we provide.
