Unity residents will be interested to know of a new car sharing scheme that has commenced in the Adelaide City South area. Car share is ideal if you use a car on an occasional basis. It gives you access to a network of new cars parked nearby and as member you will have all the benefits of a car without the hassles of owning one.

If walking, cycling and public transport are your primary modes of travel, there are still some times you may need access to a car...so why not join this 'pay as you go' service. The car sharing service is a joint initiative of Urban Ecology Australia (UEA) and GoGet Car Share - A Sydney based company with around 150 cars in the CBD and fringe areas of Sydney and Melbourne.

Commercial car sharing has been operating successfully in Europe and North America for over 30 years. It has boomed in the last 10 years and with the advent of web-based booking and management in conjunction with user-friendly 'smart card' technology.

LOGAN STREET



Unity Housing Company opened the Logan Street Affordable Housing Project in April 2009. This project has delivered 16 units for long term affordable rental to low income people in the City Of Adelaide.

The project brought together partners in the commercial, financial and philanthropic fields as well as Local, State and Commonwealth Governments. The Adelaide Bank Charitable Foundation contributed substantial funding to the project, whilst Unity contributed approximately 40% of the total project cost of \$4.06m. The business model applied to this development will contribute to the financing and development of similar housing projects by Unity in the future.

The chronic undersupply of affordable housing to those on lower incomes in our community is a challenge to us all and this project is indicative of our capacity as a community to respond effectively.

This development, located in the heart of the city, is also about community building. The diverse tenant population will help contribute to the maintenance of a robust, socially inclusive and sustainable local community.

The success of the Logan Street project is reflected in the level of participation of tenants in the local community, the high level of satisfaction expressed by the tenants and the ongoing financial viability of the site.

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As part of my social work degree, I am fortunate to be conducting a research project in partnership with Unity Housing. The project aims to explore the impact that housing has on young people's pathways through childhood and into adulthood. I have been meeting with young people aged 18-25 and asking them to talk about the importance of where they lived when they were at high school. Early results show that quality housing makes a big difference to building strong families, and also helps as a foundation for better schooling. Young people are going through a lot of uncertain changes in their lives, but feeling good about where you live and feeling like you belong to a community seems to help young people move more confidently into adulthood. I look forward to sharing the final findings when the project is completed in late October, and I thank Unity Housing for their tremendous support and interest in the study.

Those who attended the service were privileged to hear David speak about his experiences living on the streets after a number of life circumstances lead him to lose everything, including hope.

After three years of homelessness David became determined to rebuild his life.

He began by selling the *Big Issue* to generate a little income and found accommodation through Byron Place.

David credits the support and encouragement of people from a number of agencies for helping him to make the changes in his life that now see him as a valued member of the Homelessness SA Board and of the Unity Boarding House team.
