When Unity Housing tenants Olive and Keith Lee moved to Bordertown 50 years ago, there was nothing in or around their new house – just a few lightbulbs hanging inside and a plain block of land around them.

"We moved in and it was completely brand new," Olive says. "We put all the floor coverings in and the drapes and we had to start the garden completely from scratch. We brought in five truckloads of soil."

Despite not knowing much about gardening, Olive and Keith experimented with planting various plants and shrubs and everything grew from there.

"We started off with one rose and now we have about 20," Olive says. "We built a little pergola and a paved area."

While Keith is the one who does most of the gardening now, Olive enjoys spending her time painting.

"I was a big knitter but then I got arthritis and I said to a friend one day, 'I've got to do something,

it's driving me insane,'" Olive recalls. My friend said to join art classes so I went ahead and gave it a try and here I am 30 years later. I still can't draw with a pencil but give me a brush! I started off with a professional artist who came to Bordertown once a week on Sunday afternoons and when she left, I stayed in the art club and they made me secretary after three months. I love it, it's very relaxing."

Olive bestowed the Unity Housing Mount Gambier team with a painting of Olive and Keith's beloved home (pictured) in memory of Anthony, a Unity Housing staff member who passed away in 2018.

"My Housing Officer Amanda asked me to paint something for their office," Olive says. "I like detail and I like it to look real."

Between gardening and painting, Olive and Keith also spend their time with the over 50s group and recently took up learning the ukulele.

"It's a very friendly community," Olive says. "We both came from a big industrial city in Sheffield in the UK and we came straight to a country place and we've never left. We just love the country life."
