UNITY CELEBRATES TWO AWARD WINS

We are thrilled we won two awards at the 2024 CHIA SA Excellence in Community Housing Awards, held at Adelaide Pavilion in September.

Congratulations to the Unity Housing and Tesla SA Virtual Power Plant project team for winning the award for 'Excellence in Community Housing'. This project is making a significant impact by providing tenants with access to the South Australian Virtual Power Plant, which offers lower electricity prices and renewable energy solutions. This achievement highlights

Unity Housing's commitment to benefiting tenant households and the environment.

Additionally, the Street Speak project won the 'Leading Community Development Practice' award for Unity Housing and our partners – KWY Aboriginal Corporation, Point Heard, CHIA SA, and the Department of Human Services – for improving cultural understanding and engagement with Aboriginal tenants in the Limestone Coast. This initiative will continue into 2025 and we'll keep you updated on progress along the way.



Announcing our second Reconciliation Action Plan Innovate

Unity Housing provides homes for more than 700 Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander tenants and is committed to celebrating their cultures.

We completed our first Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), *Reflect*, in 2022, guided by Aunty Yvonne Agius and Vince Buckskin, and launched our second RAP, *Innovate*, in November.

Our Innovate RAP focuses on building relationships, respect, and opportunities for Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander peoples. Our recent activities include sponsoring the Kaurna football and netball teams, celebrating Reconciliation and NAIDOC Weeks, surveying Aboriginal tenants in the Limestone Coast and training staff through our Street Speak project.



We're proud to feature original artwork titled 'Togetherness' (pictured) by artist **Tanaya Antony** in our *Innovate* RAP, symbolising community togetherness. Tanaya is a Narungga artist, born and living on Kaurna land, who enjoys creating modern, bold art incorporating traditional Aboriginal symbolism.



We're excited to share an update about a beautiful mural at Unity Housing's Hocking Place building in the Adelaide CBD. It was created by Scott Rathman, a First Nations artist from the Eastern Arrernte community, now living on Kaurna Country in South Australia.

Scott's mural, which is part of our Colour Project, features two artworks that tell the story of strangers coming together in search of a safe place. Through sharing their stories, they not only find shelter but also create a new community and fresh beginnings.

Scott worked closely with tenants to gather ideas, making sure the mural reflects their experiences. Tenants have shown their appreciation of the artwork, saying: "The bright colours make the building feel less dull compared to the old concrete walls."

We're glad tenants enjoy the new mural as much as we do!

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What is FOGO?

FOGO stands for Food Organics and Garden Organics and is a kerbside collection service that allows food scraps (including meat and fish scraps, egg shells and animal droppings) to be added to your garden waste bin so it can be recycled into top quality compost. All you need is a small container; you can use an old ice cream tub or a basket with a lid, and line it with a compostable bin liner (available from the supermarket). Just make sure it has the Australian Standard compostable symbol AS 4736.

Great news for Port Augusta tenants! Starting in 2025, you can use the FOGO kitchen caddy system to collect food scraps and compostable materials before putting them in your green lidded bin for food and garden organics.

Safety at home with batteries this Christmas

Using and storing batteries safely plays an important role at Christmas. Many elements of the Christmas spirit are powered by batteries, from toys and gadgets to Christmas lights and décor.

Lithium rechargeable batteries

House fires are becoming more severe because of the increasing use of rechargeable lithium-ion battery products in homes. The complex chemical nature of these batteries can make them unstable by overcharging, not being connected correctly or overheating the battery. Lithium batteries are found in everyday items like phones, TV remotes, and power tools. If you're buying presents that require lithium-ion batteries, make sure they're manufactured by a trusted company.

Lithium coin batteries

Lithium coin batteries are dangerous small batteries for young children. Not only can they cause choking; if a lithium coin battery gets stuck in a child's throat, the saliva triggers an electrical current. This causes a chemical reaction that can severely burn the esophagus and become fatal in under two hours. If you believe a child has swallowed a battery, visit the emergency department immediately.



How to store used batteries

Store used batteries in a glass container. Ensure the container is not airtight as pressure can build up. Don't store batteries in a metal container, or with metal objects like staples and paperclips, as they can spark and create a fire hazard. Keep batteries in a cool, dry place, away from heat sources like stoves.







Here are some simple safety tips when using lithium rechargeable and coin batteries:

Keep away from children: Store batteries safely out of reach

Charge on hard surfaces: Unplug when fully charged

Store somewhere cool and dry: Avoid hot places like cars

Don't use damaged batteries: If the battery is no longer working or is swollen or leaking, dispose of it properly at a drop off point near you – for locations visit
